of 5 members effectively able to block resolutions to restore by-laws, despite a clear majority of those attending the General Meeting voting in the affirmative. If the proxy givers were indeed opposed to the by-laws, then this would be fine and democratic. But one was left with the impression that many of the proxy givers simply gave blanket authority to members of the pressure group without knowing what matters were going to be voted upon. So if you are giving your proxy to another member to vote in the election, make sure you advise him or her how you want your vote to be used with respect to the Committee election.

Better still, come to the General Meeting and make up your mind by listening to the candidates in person! Nominations for Committee positions close 7 days before the AGM (that is, on 5th March 2006) and the nominations will be placed on the members website soon afterwards.

His briefings for each pilot were meticulous and thorough. As a result all pilots understood exactly what was required of them and the flyover was executed as a flawless exhibition of airmanship. The pilots who participated can take satisfaction in a task well done. Bret has been a regular obat committee Meetings server throughout 2005 as one of five invited observers who expressed interest in working on the Committee. I extended these invitations because all of them had offered themselves for election in 2005. Bret has willingly accepted this and other assignments on your behalf.

Club Calendar

It is another pleasant duty as President to offer appreciation and thanks for hard work to Tara Stevemuer who has designed, edited and printed the 2006 Club calendar that you are receiving with this Newsletter. It is resplendent with colour photographs of SAC people, their aircraft and Club events. Pinned to your noticeboard it will provide you with a ready reference to the planned dates for Club functions in 2006. (Newsletters will carry confirmatory updates or amendments if required.) This initiative was Tara's idea entirely and she has been its champion in convincing the Committee, gathering the editorial copy and compiling it into a splendid publication. At my invitation, Tara too has been one of the regular invited observers at the Committee meetings. (The others are Bernie Stevemuer, Rick Harper and Matthew Gray.)

Fergie replacement

The Committee believes the Ferguson tractor with its slasher and bucket needs replacement with a more modern implement. Ian Harvie is our Machinery Coordinator and he suggests we should be looking to replace it with a 40 horsepower (or more) diesel tractor, preferably already equipped with a slasher and a front loading bucket. Suitable equipment may be available secondhand if one knows where to look and is on the spot at the right moment. That is why this item is placed in the Newsletter in the hope that some of you Club members will either know of a possible replacement or at least will keep your eyes open for a suitable machine. Land Assessment

The Department of Lands has not yet completed a review of the submissions it received in response to the publication of the Draft Land Assessment for Wedderburn airfield. We were advised that a large number of submissions were received and the task of assessing each one and preparing an overall summary of the views of respondents is significant. When all the views have been considered, the Department of Lands will publish the final assessment of the capability and suitability of the site. Based on that assessment, a decision will be made on whether the land can be sold to the Club. If the decision is in the affirmative, a valuation will be obtained, or the sale put to public tender.

Your Committee will be staying in close consultation with the Department of Lands to press for the earliest possible publication of the final Assessment. Accommodation at the Airfield

No Club member should be ignorant of the fact that the terms of the Club's Special Lease say no residence is allowed on the airfield except that occupied by the Caretakers. This limitation is also a requirement of the Wollondilly Land Zoning rules. Members who have overnight accommodation in their hangars were sent letters advising them that they must allow access for the building consultant retained by the Club to inspect, measure and draw plans for applications to be made to Wollondilly Shire Council. The consultant is working with the Committee to prepare those applications This process will also require the consent of the Department of Lands.

Letters have been sent by the Committee to members whose use of their overnight accommodation is thought may exceed the intention of the lease to allow "quarters for overnight accommodation", so members could have an extended weekend at the airfield without having to seek a bed elsewhere. Any use for commercial purposes is also not allowed under the terms of the lease. These letters advise that use of overnight accommodation in a hangar as a residence would breach their Hangar License Agreement. Under the specific provisions of the Hangar License Agreement, the letters advise that acknowledgement of a notice of breach sent by the Cub must be returned within 30 days of the notice being posted, and plans address the breach proposed, or the hangar license will terminate.

Any use of hangars contrary to the

Special Lease, or the Wollondilly Land Zoning rules, carries a risk to the entire Club, so the Committee agreed that it was appropriate to invoke the termination clause of the Hangar License Agreement to ensure that any such risks are addressed promptly. The Hangar License Agreement specifies rectification of the breach within 30 days, but the Committee has determined that if acknowledgement is received within 30 days a longer period may be allowed, if necessary, for the member to transfer effects to another location.

Replacement Gate Keys

Almost a year ago you all paid a \$40.00 deposit for a replacement gate key. The proposal made to the Club by the Rural Fire Service was that our existing locks be replaced by RFS locks compatible with master keys held on every fire truck in the district. Your Committee formally agreed to this proposal, having negotiated with the officers of the RFS that they would have sufficient keys to their locks cut for each member of the Club to have one. We were advised that the order for the keys had been placed with the RFS lock contractor. Follow-up enquiries discovered that the officers of the Rural Fire Service who negotiated this arrangement had been transferred elsewhere and their successors were apparently unaware of it. More enquiries gained a further undertaking from these officers that the preparation of the keys would be pursued. So far this has not happened. I ask for your patience while we continue our efforts to have the agreement implemented. Should this prove not possible within reasonable further time, then of course deposits will be credited to members accounts.

Security and Vandalism

Vandalism continues to give your Committee concern. There have been frequent incidents where the hawser fence to the north of our northern gate is vandalized to allow trail bikes and 4WD's to come and go. Letters have been written to the Local Police Area Command seeking assistance. We understand there is an intention by the police to increase the number of patrols through the area to intercept trespassers using vehicles on the Tharawal land.

The Caretakers have also had some concerns about people letting off fireworks, firearms, or other explosives in the vicinity of the airfield at night. At the very least these events pose a fire hazard and both the Police and the National Security Hotline have been advised in writing.

Hangar Developments

A subcommittee has been appointed to supervise the development of new hangar sites and the approval of hangar plans. Most of the effort is required for the new hangars being developed to the north of the Clubhouse. Recently a second development application was submitted to Wollondilly Shire Council for earthworks to install taxiways and stormwater drains. There are many decisions to be made in the implementation of these services and all plans for new hangars have to be approved on behalf of the Club Committee before they are submitted to the Department of Lands (for Landlord's consent) and to Wollondilly Shire Council for building approval.

The new subcommittee responsible for hangar developments is Bret Cavanagh, Matthew Gray, and Vic Laybutt. They will be in close liaison with Bob Sproule who contributes much of the earthmoving service where required.

Trophy Night

The venue at the Razorback Inn on December 10 was convivial and relaxed. Christmas cheer lubricated the enjoyable evening. The details of who won (again!) (need you even ask having seen the "Stop Dave" graffiti appearing around the airfield) can be read elsewhere, but as the representative of you members, I need to highlight the success of our Fly-out coordinators, Lindsay and Maree in not only managing the formal awards ceremony, but even more importantly, organizing all those events that were enjoyed throughout the year where SAC members flew and socialized together, and were judged on their success in the tasks assigned by the energetic and enthusiastic Sinclairs. Thank you Lindsay and Maree. (Maree is another welcome invited observer/contributor to Committee meetings). Look for more great events in 2006 from the imaginations of Lindsay and Maree in this newsletter

And thanks too to Margaret Adams and the Ladies Auxiliary for organizing the venue and the menu, yet this was only the last of many functions brought to SAC members in 2005 by Margaret and the Ladies Auxiliary. More thanks for all those too.

The Sparkling Newsletter!

You cannot now be anything but impressed with the new colour format of the Newsletter unveiled with this issue. Our energetic editor, David Rittie has steadily introduced content and layout improvement over 2005 to provide a better organ of communication to you members. His latest innovation is a colour supplement, so not only the webviewers see the full spectacle of photographs of members, machines and events. A lot of discussion at Committee about the value of a paper-based edition of the SAC Newsletter was based on research by our Editor (David) into ways to produce a cost-effective colour mail-out. Garth Bartlett assisted with a referral to an aviating printer who publishes the Cessna Owner's Newsletter. That proved not completely the same as our needs, but negotiations and fact-finding continue.

The Committee believes that there is a greater benefit in an attractive colour journal, despite the relatively

CAMDEN'S AUSTRALIA DAY FLYPAST

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Australia Day. It rolls around once a year, and what do most of us end up doing? Having a day off? Sleeping in? Being dragged to a family BBQ? Well, for 2006, 16 keen aviators and their self-loading ballast got together to make a solid contribution to some local community celebrations.

After the usual pre-flight shenanigans where we inevitably find little things we need to do to our fine aircraft, all the participating pilots attended the mandatory briefing in the clubhouse. Here they were handed a large pile of papers containing all sorts of information about the planned fly-past of the Camden Australia Day celebrations. Amongst these papers was CASA's version of what is required to fly over a public gathering, containing no less than 16 conditions to be met! Also in the bundle was the map showing where it was to happen, how high, how fast, by whom, and who to talk to.

After the briefing was our chance to The ringmaster on the perform. ground was young Dave Thomas, and he did a great job of marshalling all 16 of the aircraft onto runway 35 at the right time, confirming run-ups were all OK, and sending them on their way at the correct intervals. From now on this very simple and effective method should be known as the "DT start". Unfortunately the Aeronca wasn't able to fly, and that made Dave available. We couldn't have done it without him, (indeed we are already planning what part of LDT we will have to break in preparation for next year).

Red group consisted of the 4 slower

aircraft, who managed to stay pretty well all together in a group, cruising at 90kts. Red consisted of the Tomahawk, the Two Dogs (Beagle Airedale), a Skydart and an Auster. The Stinson had to pull out due to a U/S tail wheel.

White group were the 100kt cruisers, consisting of 2 Jabirus and the Grumman Tiger. As usual the Jabs just quietly did the job without any fuss.

Blue group were the speedsters, including a C210, a Robin which had been reassembled at short notice especially for the fly past (and then flown by a 57 year old grandmother!), the Cardinal, Mooney, RV9, Seneca, T18 and Nanchang. They tore along at 120kt (with the 'chang driver complaining about how slow he had to go!).

The 16 of us made our way around the planned track, and only had to make minor adjustments to keep the required distance between groups. Red Leader managed to find the turning points OK, and not lead the other 15 aircraft too far astray. But now I know how the bomber crews, especially the Pathfinders, must have felt during the war. Do you know the sinking feeling in the pit of your stomach when you hope you are heading the right way but you can't quite see the target? Let me tell you that the relief you feel when the target appears is fantastic.

Well, how did it go in the end? All the aircraft that left Wedderburn were accounted for at the end of the day, altogether a good result. We managed to fly over the correct Camden Showground, at the correct time, and at the correct height. Again, a good result. The organisers of the Camden end of the festivities were beside themselves pleased, and could not thank us enough for putting it on. Mission accomplished. I fear that it went so well that they will ask us to do it again next year. If they do, let's try to make it a record, and get over 20 aircraft flying.




Bird Talk

THE ANDERSON'S "DEFIANT" FINALLY TAKES TO THE AIR

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The Bert Rutan designed DEFIANT, which was built at Wedderburn, defied gravity for the first time as it roared into the air from Cowra Airport on Sunday, January 22nd at 11a.m.

The Defiant, VH - DFY (think about it) is a canard wing design which utilises two engines - one in front and one in back.

Dr. Jock and his son, Ian Anderson started construction nine years ago. "For the first two years we were only getting started," reports Jock, "but there has been intensive work being undertaken for the last seven years."



Jock climbs aboard to carry out the final engine run on the day before the test flight.

As would be expected with a project such as this there were many hurdles to jump, especially near the end of the construction. Such things as low rear engine RPM and apparent lack of canard lift during the take-off roll had to be resolved.

On the Sunday morning of the test flight Jock had intended only to check if he could raise the nose wheel off the ground. The nose wheel lifted off after approx 750 metres of take-off roll, and the moment that happened the aircraft unexpectedly simply took to the air. The air-



craft flew perfectly, and the airspeed easily exceeded 150 knots on the downwind leg using less than cruise power.

When asked "Whatever possessed you to take on such an enormous task?" Ian suggested that they were "a little drunk" at the time.

"Building and flight testing your own aircraft is the male equivalent of a female giving birth, but without the pain." quipped Jock.

The members of the NSW SAC congratulate Jock and Ian on the successful completion and test flight of such an interesting and unique aircraft.
